> Before a Homecoming crowd of 14,000, the Purple staged a "comeback" on last Saturday afternoon and trampled the Boilermakers in a 14 to 0 victory. The game was featured by two spectacular runs and some short line plunges by Szold and Lane. Purdue played rather poor football in the first half, but came back in the third period with real fight, and although unable to cross the goal line, had the ball to the ten yard line at two different occasions.

Lane Stars in First Period.

The game started off with an exchange of punts. Purdue lost 15 yards when Rate, recovering a fumble, ran toward his own goal line. He was downed by Saunders. Toward the end of the quarter, Purdue punted to Palmer, who carried the ball back for 8 yards. On the next play, Patterson broke through the line for a 5 yard gain, which was followed by another 5 by Lane. On the fourth down, Buddy Lane tore through the Boilermakers' line and carried the ball for 35 yards. He was brought down on the Phi, and Theta. 5 yard line, and then the quarter ended.

Szold Scores First Touchdown.

The period opened with Lane carrying the ball again, this time getting to the 1 yard line. On the second down "Dummy" Szold carried the pigskin across the Purdue goal line, scoring the first touch down for Northwestern. H. Penfield added another point by kicking goal. The playing Helen Brown a good third of Patterson was a noticeable feature during the entire half, as he tore through the Boilermakers' line for gains almost at will. The half ended just as Purdue punted to Palmer.

Purdue Nears Goal in Third,

The second half saw Purdue coming down the field with a 20 yard run, followed by successive and steady gains, until it looked as if a touch- Aged Seniors Hold down was certain. But the Purple line held, and Purdue lost the ball on downs on the 10 yard line. Lane was given the ball and he plunged through the line for a few yards. Just before the end of the period Lane punted.

Penfield Makes 65 Yard Run.

Purdue opened the period with a punt, and Palmer was downed on the 25 yard line. Lane sent the ball back into the Purdue territory with a long punt. Scanlon's warriors began their offensive again and by means of a series of successful forward passes advanced the ball to the Northwestern 35 yard line before the Purple could recover. Here the line held, and three passes were incompleted. On the fourth down, Macklin called for a pass, but the Purple linesmen were too fast and broke through the Boilermakers' line, downing the passer. The ball slipped away from Macklin. Gray Penfield scooped it up and tore down the open field toward the Purdue goal line. TRIBUNE EDITORS SCHOOL FOUNDERS

Establish School as Tribute to Memory of Joseph Medill.

Establishmen of the Joseph Medill School of Journalism as a part of Northwestern University under the sponsorship of the Chicago Tribune, to take place within a few months, was announced Saturday morning from the office of President W. D. Scott. Tho few of the vast Homecoming throng knew of it, the coincidence of the announcement with the greatest fall reunion in University history made the day a red letter one in Northwestern's history.

McCormick, Patterson Founders.

The editors of the Tribune-Robert R. McCormick and Joseph Medill Patterson—are grandsons of Joseph Medill, founder of the paper and are establishing the school as a tribute te his memory. It is rumored that many colleges and universities had requested that they be given the school before Northwestern was decided upon.

The new department comes to Northwestern because of the unusual advantages offered by this university. The Medill school will operate as a part of the School of Commerce offering courses both in Evanston and Chicago. In addition, it will have the thoro co-operation of all Chicago papers and will be able to conduct laboratory work in all of their plants.

As Good as Pulitzer School.

Advanages in training given by only one journalistic school in the United States, the Pulitzer school at Columbia University, will be given by the Joseph Medill school.

"The Joseph Medill School of Journalism aims to help newspapermen as the linotype helped the newswas the comment of Joseph Medill Patterson, co-ediotr of he Chicago Tribune.

"So far as I know, with the exception of the Pulitzer school in New York, all American schools of journalism are situated in small college towns. The advanages of a school in a great newspaper city like Chicago are obvious because the sudents in-
